- 33 hours?! Why?
 - Shows us you can do the hard work required to be on Journal
 - Endurance and attention to detail
 - Rite of passage
- Exams are anonymously graded using ASU Exam numbers.

How to prepare in the meantime...

- Breathe.
- Look through your Bluebook and "tab" rules as you go.
 - Remember: Law journals use the white pages, not bluepages.
- Review your first semester memos. Understand CREAC, IRAC, etc.
- Attend mandatory second meeting and take notes on the Bluebook Hints presentation.
