

HONORED THROUGH ACTION: Commemorating the Fiftieth Volume of the *Arizona State Law Journal**

In 1969, the Arizona State University College of Law introduced its first official legal publication to the world: *Law and the Social Order*. At the time, the law school was still in its infancy—only operating for its second year—and Dean Pedrick considered the *Journal’s* publication a “near miracle.” Now publishing its fiftieth volume, the *Arizona State Law Journal*, once known as *Law and the Social Order*, has become one of the nation’s preeminent legal publications. It has been cited by courts throughout the country, including the Supreme Court of the United States, and the works of brilliant scholars, attorneys, and judges have found a home in its pages. We are grateful to the many sponsoring organizations, contributing authors, professors, and students whose hard work and support over the years have made the *Arizona State Law Journal* what it is today.

While the name may have changed, the aim of *Journal* has not. We are determined to serve as a dependable legal resource and to publish material that is both compelling and impactful. As part of this effort, we are introducing case briefs of recent decisions made by the Arizona Supreme Court on our website, arizonastatelawjournal.org/briefs/.
